CHRISTMAS TREE SAFETY



The image you see above is not what we picture for our holiday season. Christmas trees were involved in approximately 300 fires annually from 2000 to 2004, according to the National Fire Protection Association. These fires resulted in average of 14 deaths, 21 injuries, and \$16.8 million in property damage per year. Here are some tips for Christmas tree safety.

Purchasing the Tree

- When purchasing an artificial tree, look for the label “Fire-Retardant.” (Although this label does not mean the tree won’t catch fire, it does indicate the tree will resist burning and should extinguish quickly.): When purchasing a live tree, check for freshness • A fresh tree is green. • Needles are hard to pull from branches and when bent between your fingers, needles do not break. • The trunk butt of a fresh tree is sticky with resin. • When tapped on the ground, the tree should not lose many needles. A shower of falling needles indicates that the tree is too dry. • Watch out for trees with a greenish cast to their trunks and branches; many growers spray trees with green paint to make them look more appealing.

Setting Up the Tree

- When setting up a tree at home, place it away from fireplaces, radiators, portable heaters, heater vents, and TV sets. • Cut off about two inches of the trunk to expose fresh wood for better water absorption. • Keep the stand filled with water, because heated rooms dry live trees out rapidly. A tree will absorb as much as a gallon of water or more in the first 24 hours and one or more quarts a day thereafter. • Make another fresh cut in the tree stump if a seal forms at the base. A seal of dried sap will form over the cut stump in four to six hours if water drops below the base of the tree, preventing the tree from absorbing water later when the tree stand is refilled. • To maximize freshness and minimize fire risk, keep the tree outdoors for a few days in a bucket filled with water before bringing it indoors to decorate. • If the tree seems wobbly, center it in the stand more securely and reposition the bolts or screws. If the stand is too small, buy a larger, stronger stand. The tree stand should hold at least one gallon of water. • Place the tree out of the way of traffic and do not block doorways. • Use thin guy wires to secure tall trees to walls or ceiling; the wires will be almost invisible

Decorating the Tree: Lights

- Indoors or outside, use only lights that have been tested for safety. Identify these by the label from an independent testing laboratory.
- Check each set of lights, new or old, for broken or cracked sockets, frayed or bare wires, or loose connections. Discard damaged sets or repair them before using.
- Use no more than three standard-size sets of lights per single extension cord.
- Use only one extension cord per outlet.
- Be careful where you place electrical cords. Don't run electrical cords under rugs; walking traffic can weaken the insulation and the wires can overheat, increasing the chances for fire or electric shock.
- Be careful when placing cords behind or beneath furniture; pinched cords can fray and short. Keep animals away from cords to avoid entanglement and chewing.
- Keep cords and lights away from a tree's water supply.
- Turn off all lights on trees and other decorations when you go to bed or leave the house. Lights could short and start a fire.
- Never use electric lights on a metallic tree.
- Position bulbs so that they aren't in direct contact with needles or ornaments.
- Use colored spotlights above or beside a tree, never fastened onto it! An artificial tree with high metallic content can become charged with electricity from faulty lights, and any person touching a branch could be electrocuted!
- Keep "bubbling" lights away from children. These lights with their bright colors and bubbling movement can tempt curious children to break candle-shaped glass, which can cut, and to attempt to drink liquid, which contains a hazardous chemical.



Decorating the Tree: Trimmings

- Use only non-combustible or flame-resistant materials.
- Choose tinsel or artificial icicles of plastic or nonleaded metals. Leaded materials are hazardous if ingested by children.
- Avoid the use of spun glass "angel hair" to avoid irritation to eyes and skin.
- Follow container directions carefully to avoid lung irritation while decorating with artificial snow sprays. Use spray snow that is labeled nontoxic.
- Use a step stool or stepladder when decorating the higher limbs, and make sure it is in good condition. Many home accidents occur when people fall off what-ever they are standing on.
- Never use lighted candles on a tree (even an artificial tree) or near other evergreens. In houses with small children, take special care to:
- Avoid decorations that are sharp or breakable.
- Keep trimmings with small removable parts out of the reach of children. Pieces could be swallowed or inhaled.
- Avoid trimmings that resemble candy or food. A child could eat them!

Gifts Under the Tree

- Never place paper-wrapped or paper-bagged gifts near open flames or electrical connections.
- Remove all wrapping papers, boxes, and other trash from tree and fireplace areas immediately after presents are opened.
- Do not burn wrapping paper in the fireplace. A flash fire may result as wrappings ignite suddenly and burn intensely. Gift wrapping burns very hot, causing large flames, which can ignite creosote deposits in the chimney and cause a fire in the chimney.



After the Holidays

Taking down the Christmas tree isn't nearly as much fun as putting it up. But the longer a tree stays up, the greater a fire hazard it becomes. It's best to discard trees within one month after purchase.

- When Christmas is over or the tree begins to drop needles, dispose of it.
- Do not leave it in the house or store it in the garage.
- To dispose of your tree take it to a tree recycling center or have it hauled away by a community pick-up service. If you live in the country or town where there is no tree recycling or pick-up program, contact local authorities for a recommended means of disposal.
- Never burn Christmas trees (branches or needles) in a fireplace or wood stove. Firs and pines have lots of sap, which can explode. The needles burn like tinder, quickly and fiercely. Flames can flare up out of control and send sparks flying across a room. They can also ignite creosote deposits in the chimney and cause a fire in the chimney.

A needle in a haystack: an ELT at ORD

Illinois Wing Mission Pilot

It was a warm and sunny day at the Waukegan Airshow (UGN). There were around fifty cadets and seniors, along with other cadets from different groups helping out with various tasks. I was treating lots of bee stings and a few cadets with wobbly knees, when towards the end of the airshow, we got word that we had been tasked with an actual mission – an active Emergency Locator Transmitter (ELT) somewhere near O'Hare airport (ORD). I had brought one of our aircraft, a Cessna 182T, up from Chicago Executive airport for static display at the airshow, so we had an aircraft, a Mission Pilot and Incident Commander at the airport. After looking around for an Observer to help me prosecute the ELT, I found Lt Matt Thompson who had his UDF equipment in his car. Sitting down with the IC team to brief the mission, we looked at the available data. The ELT hits seemed to be coming from an area around ORD. After briefing the weather and a coms plan, it was so close to the end of the airshow, we elected to wait the few minutes rather than disrupt things.



We launched into good VFR weather, and decided to head towards Chicago Executive (PWK) first to be sure the signal, which we heard on the Becker (automatic direction-finding radio) almost right away, wasn't coming from PWK. As we circled PWK at 2000 feet, the Becker never wavered in pointing towards ORD. I spoke to Chicago Approach Control again, and told them the situation, and informed them that it appeared the ELT was coming from ORD and that we would need to land there to try and find the aircraft and shut it off. As they vectored us out over Lake Michigan to get in sequence for the visual approach into O'Hare 27R, I wondered how smoothly we would fit into their flow. They eventually turned us onto final, and we heard the proverbial "keep your speed up" admonition. All seemed to be going well on final approach until we touched down and I heard a frustrated United 1234 call "going around, aircraft on the runway". We were doing the best we could, but we had to slow down sometime to exit the runway.

After we left the runway and contacted Ground Control, the real hunt began. The Becker was still active and pointing left, so I began taxiing towards the signal. I was following my nose through the maze of taxiways, but Ground was being very helpful in keeping an eye on me and keeping me out of trouble. Finally, it appeared we were headed to the United Airlines maintenance facility. We were abruptly told to stop and shut down, to wait for an escort onto the UA property. When they finally arrived, and I explained and demonstrated the active signal, UA maintenance supervisors and the police, allowed us to proceed. There must have been 14 planes on their ramp, but the signal seemed strongest coming from a line of about 8 regional jets at the edge of the ramp. We went over and shut down thinking it was time to get on foot to determine which aircraft was the mostly likely offender. With the maintenance staff helping us, we pulled apart four or five likely suspects without extinguishing the signal. We had two different radios, UDF gear, and still could not pinpoint the aircraft successfully. Finally, one of their avionics techs came to help, and we still could not establish the source, felt to be because of the spurious signals being generated by all the steel rebar in the concrete beneath our feet.

After two hours of fruitless searching we contacted our IC to relay our difficulties. Because it was getting dark, as well as approaching the end of a long duty day, we decided to terminate the search for the evening and send another team out in the morning to continue trying to find the elusive ELT which was still broadcasting.

Getting back into our aircraft, finally getting a VFR clearance to depart, Ground Control began to direct us to 9R for departure. Looking at the sea of blue taxi lights in front of me, I had never been so thankful for a geo-referenced taxi diagram to follow. After waiting for a gap in the departing traffic, we turned onto the active and departed, mindful of wake turbulence. We returned to base without incident.

So what happened to the ELT signal? It turns out they sent a suspect aircraft to Boston early the next morning, removing the signal from our area, but either the batteries died, or the Massachusetts Wing found it and turned it off, because we never heard anything more about it. For me, having the experience of landing at O'Hare, and negotiating a night departure was enough adventure for one day. One more day in the life of a Civil Air Patrol pilot!







"Leadership" by MSgt Frank D'Angelo, Illinois Wing Command NCO

Are you a leader? Yes, you are! When you don your Civil Air Patrol uniform, whether you realize it or not, you are seen as a leader by all who interact with you in one way or another. It doesn't matter if you are a cadet or a senior member, a civilian or a service member.

But leadership doesn't end when the uniform is doffed. True leadership is ceaseless. You might think of a leader as someone who is respected in their field of work, such as a scientist, a corporate officer, a fire chief, an astronaut, or an artist. Does their leadership take leave at the end of the workday? A true leader is not only a *professor* of their vocation, they are a professor of each aspect of life.

I view a leader in Civil Air Patrol as one who puts others first. A servant. A teacher. They are a professional at their job, but they never stop learning and improving. A leader excels in their spiritual life, family life, with friendships, in their scholastic careers, and so on.

What does a leader look like? A leader looks like you. A leader is confident but not arrogant. A leader is a master of articulating missions and their objectives. A leader doesn't always have the perfect answer. But, they know who does or where to find it. They network with other leaders. I've had the opportunity during my military career to meet exceptional leaders, and the one thing they had in common was their servant spirit. They made the effort to meet with their Airmen, to speak candidly with them, and listen to them. They were approachable and not intimidating or indifferent. They invite and accept sincere feedback without reprisal or dispute. Real leaders also recognize that they are *first and always* followers too. Regardless of your position and responsibilities in Civil Air Patrol, you must admit and recognize that there is always someone above you in the chain-of-command; that you are responsible *to* your superiors and *for* your subordinates.

I challenge all Airmen of Civil Air Patrol to recognize the leader in you, to grow a heart of a teacher, and to put others first by being a servant-Airman. Be the leader who propels others to success. Identify your strengths and weaknesses and improve on both. Finally, a leader isn't perfect, but they are not too proud to admit imperfection and learn from others. Be that kind of leader. Aim high, Airmen!

A Word on Retention



Professional Development... Okay two words, but if you haven't thought about it, your professional development officer holds a pearl when it comes to retention. As members we talk a lot about recruiting, and without question there is certainly a need. However, retention often gets lost in the quest to prepare and perform our weekly unit meetings. As recruiting and retention officers you might be aware, you/we are few, so finding ways to duplicate ourselves or at least some of the duties we are performing is crucial.

The pearl I'm talking about in professional development is progression. With all the members that come-and-go in Civil Air Patrol, "progression" is a key factor in the "go" part of that statement. When new members come into the organization you have probably heard the expression "plug them in" to the system... but what does that really mean. If you think that means get them through Level 1 right away, I'd say a resounding YES. If you think that means show them how they can get involved and participate at weekly meetings, again I'd say YES. If you think that means you've got them plugged in, I'd say, hold on... not at all.

The key to getting new members plugged in is helping them understand their specialty track. But wait... there's more! Members not only need to understand their specialty track, they actually need to perform the duties that are outlined in their specialty track pamphlet. After all, performing the duties that are outlined in the specialty track is the job description for the position. Showing up every week and participating, while helpful, is not the same as performing the duties of the position you've been assigned. Civil Air Patrol has gone to great lengths to document for us, specifically what is expected for each duty position... there's no need to reinvent the wheel, we already have the car.

So to be more specific, what's the pearl that your professional development officer holds? To answer that, I refer to the professional development specialty track CAPP 40-40. Starting as early as the technician rating, the professional development officer is to...

"...conducted a review of completed/needed training with not less than 25% of the units Senior Members with the OJT Mentor and Unit Commander."

This specific task is all about member progression, and when you have member progression you have retention. Find a way to get members to complete their specialty track rating and promote and you have retention. Celebrate the fact that a senior member has progressed to the next level and earned that next promotion "in front of the whole squadron" and you have retention. Celebrating progression is demonstrating leading by example, not only to other senior members, but to the cadets... and you better believe it, the cadets are paying attention to whether or not senior members progress. To the cadets, seeing senior members progress is so important that it could be the very reason a cadet decides he or she has a future in Civil Air Patrol beyond that of a cadet.

So get to know the professional development officer in your unit... and share these ideas. Don't have a professional development officer? ...sounds like a task for the recruiting and retention officer.

...and that's the word on recruiting and retention for this month.




Branding? That's something those Public Affairs officer care about.
